

Editorial

After listening to Mitchell Pham's talk last month about resilience, maybe some of us have been wondering what helps us to survive life's difficulties and tragedies, large and small. Perhaps part of it is the ability to see the good in small things – and to be grateful for what we have. Herald writer, Vera Alves, demonstrated this in a letter to an anonymous road worker, whom she saw dancing in the street one morning as he controlled the traffic. "You see, the world is a dumpster fire. What's not flooding is burning and what's flooding and burning is also getting

decimated by a raging pandemic. Some days, it's hard to find the good in things. Then sometimes things remind us...
Today it was you and your boogie to a non-existent song."
Another lesson in gratefulness comes in a letter to the editor from Jerry and Maria van Kuyk, who immigrated to

Auckland 50 years ago. "You welcomed us to not only our new country, but you became our new home town. We thank you for...our first rental home as newly-weds, new friends, jobs, first car, new language, our two children, new nationality, and kiwi passports, education opportunities, help build and buy our first home...children's education, freedom of religion, daughter's wedding in a beautiful church, son meeting his kiwi wife, grandchildren, volunteering opportunities, beautiful West Coast beaches, free public transport on Super gold Card, cultural flavour and cuisine, and the clean, green image. Thank you, Auckland, from the Dutch Kiwis of Henderson valley."

Life in Aotearoa New Zealand is far from perfect, but let's not take for granted its many blessings.

July Speaker: Mitchell Pham

In his moving and inspirational talk, Mitchell told us the story of his early life as a refugee. He was born in Saigon in 1975 after the end of the Vietnam war. The country had been driven into economic decline and many starved. When he was 8, his family made an unsuccessful attempt to escape the country, but were arrested and put in prison. Men were sent to hard labour and women and families put into makeshift camps alongside the Mekong River. They slept in bunks in fenced off areas open to the

elements, and at high tide the inhabitants would be up to their waists in mud. After three months, they were released, but after a second unsuccessful escape when Mitchell was ten, they were imprisoned for six months. Finally, when he was 12, and facing military service in which he was likely to lose his life, Mitchell's parents sent him alone on a boat in search of a better life. There were 67 people on the 12m boat, and they were shot at by the coastguards - Mitchell remembers people screaming, crying, praying and being seasick. When they reached international waters, there was some respite, and Mitchell sat on the Cabin roof, enjoying the sea, and watching dolphins leaping out of the water. On the fourth day, they ran out of food and water, and some talked of suicide, which Mitchell found disturbing. Everyone survived the night, and the following day, a cruise ship approached. Amazingly, after passengers had taken videos, the ship departed, offering no assistance. Finally, though, they were rescued by an oil tanker, who showed them amazing kindness. That night, there was a huge storm, which would have killed everyone had they still been at sea, so they felt "the luckiest people on the planet". Mitchell then spent four years at a refugee camp in Indonesia, where, once again, suicide became an option taken by some. He had picked up some English and decided to do teachers' training at a UNCR language school, where he earned the respect of his elders. He found the work empowering so joined a volunteer group to build two beautiful Buddhist temples. He learnt the power of religion: once people had a place of worship the suicide rate dropped by 90%. He recognised that we don't have to be victims, and can have an impact on our environment. Finally, he was picked up by New Zealand as a refugee. He believes that his journey shaped him as a person and has helped him to build the successful life he now has. Mitchell told his amazing story of resilience without a trace of self-pity, and as several members said, his story puts our own problems and concerns into perspective. As Huck pointed out in his speech of thanks, "Vietnam's loss is New Zealand's gain".

Howick contingent of 8 people attended the gathering at the Westgate Baptist Church on Thursday. The day was run with military precision and attendees just had to sit back in the bright modern church and enjoy the day. The main speaker, Steve Braunias spoke with skill and humour about various murder trials he has attended: He spoke of the "piece of sh*t" Jesse Kempton, killer of Grace Millaine, Mark Lundy, Susan Burdette, and of the wrongful conviction of Teina Pora and Arthur Allen Thomas. He spoke in detail about the recent trial of Eli Epiha, killer of Matthew Hunt. He pointed out how difficult it can be to know the truth in these situations, and his uncertainty of the guilt of Mark Lundy, and of the driver of Epiha's getaway car, who, it turns out, did not know him and whose motives, in spite of her conviction for accessory after the fact, seemed rather muddied to Mr Braunias.

The other speakers presented topics ranging from herb-growing, amusing incidents in the life of a celebrant, to travel stories about antarctica and bus trips to India. All the talks were engaging, and most were well-presented and often very funny. Our own Joan Clarkson, who spoke with poignancy and touches of humour about her experience of a bank robbery, was up there with the best of them. A good day!
