General Meeting July



The AGM took place with audience participation in the form of "Aye", and the new 2020/2021 Committee is now formally elected.

David Dwerryhouse, the outgoing President, was given a rose bush, presented by the incoming President, Geraldine Rose.

Outgoing committee members Cora Young and Chua Huck Cheng were also given gifts for their hard work over many years.

After the AGM, we were treated to a smorgasbord of talks, demonstrating the talent and interesting life experiences of our members.

We began with a ten-minute talk by Christopher Nixon, who woke up our brain cells with his ten-minute talk posing the question, "Do you ever get a shove along in life?"

A child seeing a dead person joining in a hunting match, meaningful coincidences, premonitions and other events beyond our understanding can be either explored or ignored, as Christopher pointed out. He believes that a growing knowledge of quantum physics may begin to throw light on the issue – it seems that entangled particles can communicate over space, and even be in two places at once. To fully bend our minds he left us with the thought that solid objects are really just energy, and that time may be little more than an illusion.

After listening to a story about a young boy who dealt in his own way with a lunch-thieving bully – think spiders – we listened to our main speakers – whose stories were both fascinating.

Beth Voogd's talk transported us into another world. She talked about the life of her husband, Gerhard, who grew up in occupied Holland during the war. Gerhard's father was in the Dutch Resistance movement, which provided information to the Allies and saved the lives of thousands of Jewish people. Surprisingly, during that time, Audrey Hepburn performed

secretly in people's homes to raise funds for those sheltering Jewish families – with doors and windows shut and darkened so as not to arouse the suspicion of the Germans.

Gerhard grew up in an atmosphere of fear. Apparently, his father was taken away by the Germans at one point, but inexplicably, was released after a lashing. From time to time, the Germans would search the house, and Gerhard and his brothers would tremble in their beds. Indeed, behind a wardrobe, a secret door led to an area where Jewish people were hiding, so danger was always present. Gerhard made many errands for his father, and occasionally, if he stayed out after curfew, he would have to run home with his friends - dodging bullets.

In the Spring of 1944, Gerhard was sent by his father to cycle to another village – to deliver some documents to families who were sheltering Jews. On his way he saw coming towards him a cavalcade of German tanks and army trucks retreating from allied forces. He jumped into a ditch as an allied Spitfire strafed the road, aiming at the German soldiers. Gerhard never found out why his father had sent him on such a dangerous mission.

In a link back to Christopher's talk about meaningful coincidences, Beth finished with an amazing story. One day, after he came to New Zealand, Gerhard went to Franz Joseph and met an ex-airman who was shot down in Holland during the war. He had been rescued by Gerhard's father. The airman showed Gerhard a watch he had been given. It was Gerhard's father's watch!

Chris



Chris Cameron's talk took us to a world much closer to home, but equally interesting. Chris has Maori heritage through his mother who grew up in rural New Zealand and went to a "Native School". The schools were set up in the 1860's initially to "educate and

civilise" Maori and to encourage integration. In 1947, the schools became known as Maori schools, but instruction continued mainly in English. Often the schools had just one or two teachers, and some were only accessible by boat or horse.

Chris's mother lived in the bush at Karekare, where her father was a forestry worker. There were three schools in the neighbourhood – Piha, Karekare and Whatipu – and the one teacher worked for two days at each school. From time to time, Chris's mother wagged school, so she was sent to live in Auckland, where she had to wear dresses, was not allowed to carry a sheath knife and had to go to Sunday school!

She went to training college where she met and married Chris's father. Her first positions were in the Native School system, where she lived with local farming families and taught in year one classes. She became teacher, mother and nurse, and even started a school lunch scheme. After she married in 1934, she was posted to Motiti Island, near Tauranga where the Maori community were mostly Anglican or Ratana. During the week, she boarded with local farmers while her husband taught at Waihi School. She was well-looked after by the island people, and the children she taught were shy and obedient.

In 1939, when Chris was four, his parents were finally posted together at Kokupu School, and Chris remembers being "mothered" by the older students. When Chris's father went into the army (he was tragically killed in action in 1943) his mother was posted to Cornwall Park School, a wealthy Pakeha school. This was the end of an era for the family. In 1969 Native/ Maori schools were merged into the mainstream system – now only surviving in historical memory.
