
ANTHROPOLOGY GROUPS RENAMED

REPORT ON LAST MONTH'S TALK

FIONA JEFFCOAT-YU: SOLITARY ON THE CAMINO TRAIL

LAST month's guest speaker Fiona Jeffcoat-Yu gave a deeply personal account of her walk on the Camino de Santiago trails in Spain. During the Middle Ages pilgrims endured the months-long deprivation as a rite of religious devotion. In contemporary times, the Camino has grown into a tourist draw attracting history and culture buffs, fitness fanatics, tourists, and burnt-out careerists seeking escape from work and terrible bosses. Some do shortened versions combining walking and motorised transport. And pilgrims seeking spiritual nourishment continue to flock there.

But the feeling of life-affirming triumph in completing the journey entirely on foot is common to those who have taken on its rigours. Thus it was for Mrs Jeffcoat-Yu. She started on the French side of the Pyrenees – the Camino Frances or French route — and reached Santiago de Compostela after 41 days – walking on 34 days, on the other days recharging and enjoying Spain's architectural and culinary delights. Places like Pamplona (vibrant street life), Burgos and Leon (art, cathedrals and more art) were memorable milestones. She covered 791 km in all. There were blisters, hard beds and the loneliness that envelopes a long-distance walker. Crossing the Pyrenees she encountered only horses, their bells breaking the highland hush. For 80 per cent of the trail, she walked alone as having constant companions, she admitted freely, could prove a strain.

It was "total bliss" at the end of it. Locals along the route were kind, placing water and fruit on roadside tables. At a particular spot there was free wine on tap, the spout mounted to a public wall adorned with art. She shared meals with villagers, who sent her on her way with a reminder to always stick to paths marked with the yellow scallop shell, the symbol of the Camino. "If I can trust a shell I can trust life in general," she told herself.

The Camino test came about because she wanted a change of direction after years teaching in New Zealand and Hong Kong. The decision was easy. Where she lives, in Howick, she has always walked going about her business, a pack to her back. She can't get enough of travel. After seeing a film on the Camino trails, she knew this was what she wanted to do as a precursor to a career change. She is training to be an arts therapist, using creative processes in art and performance as a healing therapy in rehabilitative work with people like stroke sufferers and victims of abuse.

Of the three phases of the Camino experience – physical, mental and spiritual – she regarded the closing stage of 100 km over rising steepness as its apogee, a lived spirituality. And there it was, the magnificent Cathedral of Santiago de Compostela. Pilgrims Mass attended and a 'graduating' certificate in hand this was, as she put it, a transcendent phase of her life. It personified for her what the Camino might have meant to devotees in ancient times, many of whom were said to treat it as more significant than going to Rome or Jerusalem. She plans to return.
