# NEW HOME FOR HOWICK U3A

THE Howick Bowling Club will be Howick U3A's new 'home', starting with the July meeting. President Margaret Nicholls announced this to applause at last month's meeting. This facility is better than the Nixon Hall in every respect: spaciousness, range of facilities, ambience and the general aspect. Besides, and this is important, ample parking on level ground makes manoeuvring of cars easier than kerb-side parking on the undulating Sale Street and its side lanes.

The Auckland Council-owned Nixon Hall is no longer fit for purpose. The committee had for some time been made aware of members' unhappiness with the state of the toilets. There had also been the odd occasion when malfunctioning locks required urgent calls to be made to Council to secure entry on meeting days. Ventilation is poor. There is no installed sound and video system, a notable omission for a meeting hall. Above all, rent is to be raised from January 2019. We will be charged \$100 a month for the use of the Bowling Club, against \$81 we paid for Nixon Hall. The hike will not place a burden on Howick U3A's finances; it is small considering the superior facilities. Howick U3A has been refunded for the rent paid in advance for Nixon Hall, less a cancellation charge of \$150.

A note of caution: Drive carefully when entering and exiting the club's car park as the one-way roads are steep and rather tight.

#### FAREWELL TO THE PEARSONS

TIM Pearson and Kerry, who are moving away to live in Pauanui after 36 years in Howick, were bid a fond farewell by members last month. Mr Pearson was Howick U3A president in 2015/16 and had been with the club for eight years. Mrs Pearson had an even longer association, for 14 years. President Margaret Nicholls spoke for many when she expressed appreciation for Mr Pearson's work in rewriting Howick U3A's constitution and his participation in numerous study groups. As a stalwart of the textile industry in his working life, he was elected a Fellow of the Textile Institute. He had also been tapped by the government to help resolve industry disputes between New Zealand and Australia in the late 1980s and early 1990s under the Closer Economic Relations pact.

As for their new phase in trendy Pauanui ('Our home is by a lovely golf course,' he enthused), Mr Pearson may start a community initiative like the U3A there. The Pearsons thanked members for their friendship and wished them well.



## ITALIAN NORTH SHORE BOY

This month's guest speaker Giuseppe Gallina (picture) moved to New Zealand in 1993 from Italy. He will recount his experiences as an immigrant in a country nearly as multi-cultural and multi-ethnic as Australia, which has a sizeable Italian presence. A resident of Milford, he describes himself as a North Shore boy through and through.

#### SEX AND TAX: THE LINK

WHAT does sexually transmitted disease (STD) have to do with New Zealand's revenue base? Plenty, but few people may see the nexus. In her talk last month on infectious diseases and drug-resistant bacteria, microbiologist Siouxsie Wiles spoke of how STD -- principally chlamydia, widespread in many countries and whose symptoms are easy to miss -- can lead to infertility in men and women.

For a low-population, fast ageing country like New Zealand, the consequences then become clear. Reproductive impediments coming on top of a historically low total fertility rate will over time result in a shrinking tax take as, proportionally, there will be fewer working-age people to replenish a work force depleted by accelerating ageing. This could be New Zealand's dilemma, similar to Japan and Singapore. New Zealand's 1.8 fertility rate in 2017 is below the replacement rate of 2.1 at which level the population stays constant.

Outcome: tax revenue stagnates or declines, the country's fiscal position gets out of whack and urgent capital and recurrent social expenditures are cut back. Dr Wiles gave her audience the example of funding for superannuation becoming problematic in the not too distant future. It would in part be attributable to the proclivity among twenty-somethings for unprotected sex, leading possibly to infections and infertility. Not only the young but also among the middle-aged, according to her data.

The stark message in Dr Wiles's talk was that New Zealand could do a better job of prevention and control of communicable diseases (it has the highest rate of increase in the OECD developed world), and that more resources need to be allocated for research and development of new vaccines and antibiotics. Her own research unit in Auckland University has been chronically under-funded, she said.
