Of concern to the worldwide scientific community is the liberal use of antibiotics leading to the entrenchment of drug-resistant superbugs. UK-born Dr Wiles received her PhD from Oxford. She relocated to New Zealand in 2009.

FURTHER to last month's item on the Booker prize special, the jurors' picks of the best novel from each of the past five decades are in: *In a Free State* (1971, V.S. Naipaul); *Moon Tiger* (1987, Penelope Lively); *The English Patient* (1992, Michael Ondaatje); *Wolf Hall* (2009, Hilary Mantel); and *Lincoln in the Bardo* (2017, George Saunders). One of these novels will be chosen by public voting on the website themanbookerprize.com/vote as the winner of the Golden Man Booker Prize to mark the 50th year milestone of the award. The winner will be announced on July 8.
