I watched on TV recently a well-known celebrity who visited New Zealand to do a show. He said he felt as if he had stepped back in time – to a past and simpler way of life – as if we were marooned on a peaceful island as history rages around us. Sometimes I feel that ageing is a rather similar experience. Where we were once immersed in history, we have now slowed down and have become in some ways marooned observers rather than participators. It has all become rather confusing. What is true and what is "false news"? Is that rather odd email message really from my friend, or am I being hacked? How do I "clear my cache" so that my missing texts will re-appear? I have to say, though, that I really appreciate the company of thinking older people, whose minds remain curious and open, and whose long lives have wisdom along with the inevitable confusion of life in the modern world. May Speaker: Mick Clout



Professor Mick Clout gave us an interesting and professional talk about the importance of biodiversity in New Zealand and about his work and research with the Kakapo. He pointed out that New Zealand was the last land mass settled by humans and has a unique biodiversity which is currently under threat.

There have been two phases of settlement in New Zealand. Maori settlement in medieval times led to forest clearance and two introduced species – the dog and the kiori (rat) .European

settlement in the 1800's saw 2000 species introduced, causing major threats to indigenous wildlife.

The kakapo, which Professor Clout has been studying, is particularly under threat. These herbivorous birds are flightless and have a long lifespan but low reproduction rate. They breed every 2 to 4 years stimulated by mast years especially in rimu forests. This heavy fruiting provides food for the birds but also attracts increased numbers of predators such as rats and stoats. Kakapo lay only 2 eggs, and the females raise the chicks. This makes them vulnerable to predation, and their numbers have become dangerously low.

Between 1949 and 1977 only 18 birds were found. There were no females. In 1977, several kakapo were found on Stewart Island, including females. The birds were taken from Stewart Island to predator -free islands, and a kakapo recovery programme was set up. This involved monitoring with radio transmitters, nest protection, extra food and hand-raising of chicks.

Supplementary feeding started in 1990. The birds thrived but didn't improve the female ratio. Researchers worked out that, as male nestlings need more food, females in good condition tend to raise males. Experiments proved this. So the researchers decided to feed only if the female weighed less than 1.5 kilos, and once the eggs were laid, feeding could be increased. As a result of this work, adult survival rate increased from 46 to 99% and the chicks' survival was also up.

The kakapo population is now 204. Most of the chicks are raised on predator-free islands and new islands are being cleared. Ten percent of islands are currently pest-free and we could get to 50% in a decade. Several inhabited islands are under management but not under control. Some mammals have become resistant to 1080 and interactions between mammals are not completely understood. Predator free New Zealand remains a distant goal.

To end his talk, Clout looked towards the future of conservation in New Zealand. Can we control possums? Will the public support the control of cats? Will climate change affect biodiversity? Should we have more reserves? Can we protect our fishing waters? There is clearly a lot more to be learnt.

June Speaker: Dr Niven Brown

Dr Niven is an outreach coordinator for the Auckland Astronomical Society. He is passionate about sharing the beauty of the night sky and the wonders of the universe with people. He has a PhD in Mechanical Engineering and has been a member of the Auckland Astronomical Society for 10 years.

His talk is entitled:

"Our place in the stars"

It is an interactive presentation that takes the audience on a journey from planet Earth to the beginning of time and space. We will get to understand space and why things are astronomically big. If there is time and it is sunny, we will have the opportunity to look safely at the sun through a solar telescope after the meeting.
