#### Speaker: Sally Barclay



Sally gave us an informative talk on the restoration of the Mangemangeroa Reserve. In 1988, the farm land owned by the Somerville family was subdivided, and after a campaign by local people, part of the land was set up as a reserve. In 2000, a group called Friends of Mangemangeroa (FOM) began work on restoring the native forest on the narrow strip of land lining the estuary. The land is currently owned by the Government, and governed by the Council in partnership with FOM. The Council maintains the tracks and fences, and sprays the noxious weeds such as kikuyu grass, gorse, pampas and blackberry, while FOM focus on protecting and replanting the large number of native species in the reserve. Kokekohe, Puriri, Taraire, Hangi-hangi, Kawakawa and Totara can be seen in the forest, as

well as understorey plants such as Manukau black fern, Nikau and Manuka, as well as rushes along the saltmarshes. There is a huge amount of work involved in forest regeneration. Soil must be prepared, seeds collected and grown in the nursery before being planted out in plastic protective sheaths, as the new growth must be protected from drought, rabbits possums and pukeko. Where the land has slipped due to erosion, wood brush is laid to stabilise the land. In parts, weed mat is laid down, although in some cases the matting, which is imported from China, brings in its own weeds which must be removed. Many members of the Public assist with the work, including a Wednesday morning weeding group, and students from Cockle bay Primary and Somerville Intermediate. Sally showed us a lovely photo of primary students, all wearing bright blue gloves, absorbed in pricking out seedlings ready for replanting.

Sally's talk certainly made us aware of the dedication of all those involved in the protection and restoration of an invaluable natural resource.

#### March Speaker\*:



Mick Clout is an emeritus professor at the University of Auckland and has broad interest in the applications of ecological science to conservation. Originally from the UK (where he studied ecological science at the University of Edinburgh) Mick gained a PhD from the University of Auckland in 1977, studying the ecology of brushtail possums. He then commenced his science career with DSIR Ecology Division at Nelson, from 1977-1989. In 1989 he joined the NZ Department of Conservation as Research Manager, where he also acted as Director of Protected Species. In 1993 Mick became an academic at the University of Auckland and extended his research interests into areas of biosecurity and invasive species management. He

is a Fellow of the Royal Society of New Zealand (RSNZ) and was awarded the 2007 Sir Peter Scott Medal for Conservation Merit, the 2008 RSNZ Charles Fleming Award for Environmental Achievement and the 2014 Marsden Medal. Mick was the founding Chair of the Invasive Species Specialist Group of IUCN (which he led from 1995-2008), the Chair of the NZ Biosecurity Ministerial Advisory Committee from 2005-2013, and was a member of the NZ Conservation Authority from 2011-2020. He has chaired the Kakapo Recovery Group for the past 25 years.


#### Out and about
