Recently an ad popped up saying, "scroll down to keep reading" and as you scroll, the top ad rolls away like a skin to reveal more details. And, apparently, there are some electronic billboards which read your face as you walk past to determine age, ethnicity etc and the screen shifts accordingly.


One can't help thinking that if such ingenuity were applied to climate change or poverty, we might be getting somewhere.

August Speaker: Jenny Lynch



We were all able to identify with the talk this month about advertising in the past, taking us on a delightful trip down memory lane. Within minutes, Jenny had us singing the full version of "broke my dentures", which certainly broke the ice.

Advertising is the life blood of the magazine. Magazine advertisements were matched to the needs and interests of the reader. They could be informative, imaginative or just plain bonkers – anything to attract the attention and encourage a purchase.

For a long time, England was regarded as home, and P&O advertised their voyages as "Home via Suez"

Women's magazines were full of euphemism: the menopause was referred to as. "the little troubles that come to women over 40". Women's ads appealed to the little woman at home, and electric ranges, beauty aids and a typical Christmas present would be an iron!

In the 1930s and 40s, men had most of the purchasing power, and the ads had an outdoorsy, blokey vibe. Tents, sleeping bags and of course cars, such as the crank-handled 1933 Austin and the Humber Snipe. In the 60's, youth took centre stage.

Adverts often appealed to people's fear and shame. Disease was a constant threat without penicillin, and life was precarious. There was an obsession with constipation, which apparently caused pimples and depression. These problems could be alleviated by Junipah, Beechams pills and Milk of Magnesia. Carter's little liver pills were also popular. For colds, Baxters lung preserver, with its 10 percent alcohol, was a popular remedy and claimed to cure bronchitis or asthma and even consumption (Tuberculosis). Then there was Instant Relief Mountain Powder, Dr Williams pink pills for bloodless children and Horlicks for night starvation. Ovaltine was recommended by Jean Batten, and Doctors recommended cigarettes for sore throats.

For women of a certain age, the fear was that beauty was fading and the husband might start to wander. Slimzal could help you lose a pound a day, and in the meantime Berleigh's Corsets would conceal the unwanted pounds. In the 1940's, the women's weekly suggested that with Biocel skin food lines would be gone. Pears toilet soap was endorsed Lily Langtry, and dandruff would be sent packing if you shampooed with Listerine. Lifebuoy, Mum cream and Odoromo would dispel the body odour that would surely drive the men away.

Of course, women must not neglect her domestic duties. If your clothes were not Persil white on the clothesline, shame on you.

Of course, women must be romantic. Lipstick, giving you, "luscious lips he longs to kiss", face powder and home permanents would make you irresistible to men.

In fact, some products would not be considered safe these days. High levels of alcohol, arsenic and cocaine – found in Coca Cola – were used in some products.

As Warren Yardley pointed out when thanking the speaker, the talk was full of the satire and irony of advertising, and was enjoyed by all.
