#### **OUT OF THE PERSIAN GULF**

Kiwi teachers of English are all over the map, in a manner of speaking. Today's speaker David Howard (picture) is one of this intrepid breed, teaching in the Arab-speaking world -- in Oman. The country is smack in the middle of volatile West Asia, more widely known as the Middle East. Oman has the same population as New Zealand's, but similarities end there. Let Mr Howard tell you about not only the pedagogy but also the culture and customs of Oman – and the brittle atmospherics of the region. Oman shares borders with Yemen, Saudi Arabia and the United Arab Emirates.
