NETWORK REPORT AUGUST 2023

The Auckland U3A network event was held on Saturday 29th July at the Salvation Army Headquarters. My guesstimate is that there was 300+ people in attendance.

The morning speaker was **Chris Finlayson**, a lawyer, and retired Member of Parliament. His talk dealt with the Treaty of Waitangi, Treaty settlements and how co-governance can be part of these settlements. There was no mention of three waters.

The afternoon speaker was **Dr. Paul Buchanan** on NZ's changing threat environment. The first part was a little of his early life, and then about current threats. After WW2 America and Russia were the two major powers. Russia,

he considers has lost its place as a superpower and America is declining in influence, with China, India and Brazil on the rise. He feels that threats to NZ will come internally, although he gave no details of any.

There were four mini presentations that covered a wide range of subjects.

- The first was Tranquebar, which in 1620 become a Danish trading port of the southeast coast of India. We were shown pictures of the town and details of Danish history and influencers.
- Before and after WW2 aerial passengers were transported by flying boats. This talk covered the formation of Tasman Empire Airways (TEAL) and the aircraft and routes they covered.
- Residents of Crestwood Retirement Village take sustainability seriously, collecting food scraps for composting, and being vigilant about disposing of re-cyclable and non-recyclable material. A more targeted approach to rubbish collection than that provided by the council.
- Going to a sub-Antarctic Island with no medical facilities and a patient who is a hemophiliac is a challenge. This talk covered what was involved, the planning and the successful journey to and from the island.

Both Gaynor and I enjoyed the day, and would consider going next year as long as they have the same caterers, who provided an excellent packed lunch.

OUR AUGUST SPEAKER for 14th August 2023 is Jan Beaumont



"When Jan Beaumont sat down on her couch in late March 2020, little did she realise how her life would change in the next year.

Three days before, the Prime Minister had announced that NZ would go into lockdown for 4 weeks as a result of Covid 19. Jan had never written a poem before but something about the situation inspired her to write 'Let's All Drink to Lockdown'. Within days it had gone viral and was read by thousands of people around the world. And there the story starts ..."

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OUR JULY SPEAKER WAS PAUL MOON who was introduced by Pat James

Paul Moon ONZM, Doctor of Literature, Doctor of Philosophy, Master of Philosophy, Master of Arts, is Professor of History at Auckland University of Technology, and a Fellow of the Royal Historical Society at University College, London. He spoke on Nostalgia and Utopianism **how we rely on it and covered examples such** as Napier's Art Deco, and how we often only get the nice memories, and thus get history wrong. In Politics it is the golden age that is remembered. We look back at our own history and often only remember the 'good old days'. The artist Charles Heaphy painted picture of a nostalgic past, then was State Housing and the ³/₄ acre section which would solve all social problems etc. But we can't live without it as we need a sense of belonging.


<u>BOOK REVIEW Meetings</u> are held on the 1 st Tuesday of the month, 10am.
