Memory Lane Music Group report -

One of the items at our February meeting went as far down Memory Lane as one can go. In 1950 some clay tablets were unearthed at the site of the old city of Ugaril in Northern Syria. They date from around 1400BC and include the earliest "song sheet" ever found. It is a




hymn to the goddess of orchards. Lutes and lyres were in use at the time but we listened to two unaccompanied (and sliahtly different) sung versions translated from Hurrian cuneiform the symbols - a copy is shown here by Drs Anne Kilmer and Richard Dumbrill in 1974 and 1998 respectively. An instrumental version (played on a modern lyre

by Michael Levy) of Dr Dumbrill's interpretation of the tablet inscription has also been recorded.

Also in February we were saddened to hear of the death of the foremost light popular music composer of the late 20th Century. Burt Bacharach died on the 9th and we included three of his distinctive tunes, and a tribute to his work, in the programme.

There have been several German (and at least three English language) films featuring the life and music of Johann Strauss. In 1963 the Walt Disney studios produced *The Waltz King*. Much of it was filmed in Austria and – sixty years on – it still looks and sounds very good. Bruce Dale screened this movie for us, in his theatrette, for our March meeting.





The orchestrator (whoever he was) did a pretty good job of fitting one West End show tune from each of those years into the 16 minutes available on the discs. The selection ranged from "Come to the Ball" (A Quaker Girl, 1910) to the last item,

"I'm on a See-Saw" (*Jill Darling*, 1935). It could hardly be bettered as a potted history of early 20th Century musicals. The Geraldo orchestra and the three vocalists named on the sleeve were the featured artists.

The World's Greatest Geological Wonders

This is an 18 month course and we have just 2 more sessions remaining. Our lecturer is Michael Wysession, Ph.D, of Washington University St Louis.

We have had the most amazing and fascinating journey around the world, encompassing oceans, tides, rivers, mountains, volcanoes, rocks, deserts, snow and ice, to mention but a few of the topics included in the course.

Professor Wysession has given us interesting and absorbing lectures with superb photographs, sometimes demonstrating simple experiments to clarify the points he is discussing. We have been able to easily understand his lectures and we all have enjoyed the course very much, perhaps to the extent that we would like to start all over again!

It would be difficult to identify highlights of the course - our world is such a complex and fascinating place. New Zealand's Fiordland National Park has a lecture devoted to its uniqueness.

We will all complete the course with a greater knowledge of the world's greatest geological wonders.
