At the end of November and into December I decided to go on a 16 day small-group tour, this time to the United Arab Emirates and Oman. I thought I might as well take the plunge – I could catch Covid just as easily in New Zealand as I could overseas and I found myself with itchy feet again! It was a most interesting trip and I particularly enjoyed Oman as we explored the countryside rather than spending too much time in cities – much more to my liking.

Throughout the trip we enjoyed a wide range of experiences, including a sudden downpour which flooded the streets in Sharjah, a visit to the "Louvre" in Abu Dhabi which was particularly enjoyable for me – they had an Impressionist Exhibition which had paintings we had been learning about in our Monet to van Gogh lecture series, so a real treat. We visited huge mosques, palaces, forts, souks, museums and an opera house, family homes where we shared a meal (served by the men of the household), a falcon hospital, and drank coffee topped with gold leaf.

In Oman we travelled everywhere in 4-wheel drive Land Cruisers or similar (3-4 of us per vehicle) with our own guides/drivers – ours was great. We took a twilight cruise down the coast of Muscat, drove up and down huge sand dunes and stayed in the desert and up mountains, wandered round a dhow building shipyard, saw graveyards that looked nothing like our cemeteries, and were amazed at the mountains with so many different colours and rock formations. All this and so much more! It felt great to be getting back to exploring the world again.

In closing I would like to encourage you all to attend our monthly meetings whenever possible – there's plenty of room, we have a great range of speakers, it's a great way to learn about our community and the wider world - and the fellowship is great for our mental health as well!

I look forward to seeing you at our February meeting and throughout the year.

POETRY APPRECIATION



MEMORY LANE MUSIC

During the final three meetings of 2022 we introduced a segment where one specific artist or composer is featured. A brief sketch of their lives is given and three or four examples of their work are played. About twenty – often quite dissimilar, for variety's sake – ballads, orchestral, choral and musical/operetta pieces make up the rest of the programme.



In November we listened to the music of Jimmy Kennedy and Michael Carr. They were a very successful pair of composer/lyricists in Britain during the 1930s and early 1940s. Although they are heard rarely today, their most popular tunes like "Home Town" and "South of the Border" still wear very well.

A very fine two-CD set of Oscar Natzka's recordings was made in 2000 by NZ National Library. Natzka's widow, Winifred Coburn, made her collection of his recordings available to the compilers. The old 78s were reproduced with much care by National Library. We used this set for our "featured" programme in October.

Hollywood produced film versions of most of Sigmund Romberg's very successful stage musicals. The Austro-Hungarian composer also wrote songs for some original film musicals. "Viennese Nights" was the first the of them (made in collaboration with Oscar Hammerstein in 1930.) Prints of many of these very early musical films are lost but, interestingly, a colour version of "Viennese Nights" has survived. Parts of it – and several 78rpm selections – are back in circulation, thanks to You Tube. Romberg's melodies are always worth listening to. We heard some from this film at another of our meetings in the last quarter of 2022.

CURRENT ISSUES DISCUSSION GROUP

At this time the group has a membership of 26, which is a maximum number. We will again meet monthly in the Community Room at the Springlands Lifestyle Village. This is an excellent venue.
