Monthly Meetings

Monthly Meeting Report for 10 October 2022

The President, Gwyneth Lowe, opened the meeting at 2 pm, welcoming 73 members and two visitors. The first part of the meeting was the AGM and the minutes of that meeting have been reported separately.

General Business: Ann Morgan spoke briefly about the activities of the Local History Group, which has unfortunately now been in abeyance for several years. She had been running it for the last three years of its active existence. Any members potentially interested in joining a reconstituted group might want to try contacting Ann first; the Secretary can forward messages from those who don't have her contact details.



Our Guest Speaker, Pieter Johnson, now living in Blenheim, was born in what was then Southern Rhodesia – nowadays Zimbabwe – and grew up there and in Tanzania and Kenya.

Being from a rural farming family, almost all his childhood friends were from African tribes and he spoke mainly Afrikaans (at home) and Shona (with his friends).

As a youth he got to know Joy Adamson (author of 'Born Free') and spent time with her and her husband in their bush camp "in the middle of nowhere", where lion cubs were roaming freely. He said he knew her more as an artist than as a wildlife protectionist at the time. "Growing up in wild country gives you a different perspective on life", he said. "You learn to respect wild animals and in the process develop an affinity with them".



An affinity that came in useful when a close friend became a photographer for National Geographic and they operated together; subsequently he took photographs for NG in his own right. He

showed one of his photographs: a stunning shot of a leopard and her cub approaching head on at quite close range; he and his colleague had been in the bush for two weeks when that photo-opportunity arrived (patience is a virtue for wildlife photography!).

While still in his teens he was conscripted into the Rhodesian Army (this was just after UDI) but was surprised to find that most of the people they were fighting against were Russian or Chinese; he alluded to his time in the Special Forces there, but without going into detail...



Pieter then described his subsequent work with wildlife conservation and photography, including close encounters with potentially dangerous animals such as gorillas and rhinos. In such circumstances, he said, mutual respect is the safest policy, as they pick up emotions: he also recommended it as

a great way to manage all interactions, including with other people.

After further description of conservation work in Southern Africa, including three months in the Kalahari Desert with the Bushmen, he summed up his conclusion that "the logic of the bush is far more logical then the logic of the town".

Pieter then revealed his long-time love of music, particularly involving ancient instruments such as the 'Pan Flute' which he said originated simultaneously in South America, Europe, Africa and China about 12,000 years ago. He then gave us a short demonstration of the flute – the first time ever he had played in public!

Finally he revealed why he came to New Zealand, in 2005: "...here voting is done with a pen, not a gun."

After a few questions and a word of thanks from Gwyneth, the meeting closed at 1545 – Gwyneth's last act as President. The next monthly meeting will be on 14 November. Speaker to be advised.

Fimblefamble


A 19th-century British slang term for a really lame excuse - think "I can't go out because I have to, uh ... wash my hair!"
