Last Month's Speaker

Allan Michael M.Sc., Ph.D.

A Life of Science in the USA

Born the youngest of eight children, oceanographer Allan Michael is an Otahuhu boy who spent his primary and secondary education in the same class as David Lange before ending up as Head Boy at Otahuhu College in 1959. He went on to obtain his bachelor's and master's degrees at Auckland University and then was offered a scholarship to Woods Hole, Cape Cod, to study the United States' ocean's resources.

Alan talked of his 40 years experience in the U.S where he investigated oil spills, nuclear power plant effluents, ecological risk assessments and offshore oil and gas – projects in his own special area of research, and principally in the Gulf of Maine. For most of these studies Allan used the same local fisherman and their valuable friendship continued for over 35 years.

He was involved in the design and execution of some of the largest marine monitoring programs conducted in the U.S and assisted in developing regulations and permits for offshore oil and gas exploration throughout the U.S. Allan expressed his frustrations when dealing with the commercial sector and their continuous search for profits.

A fascinating and informative presentation on the study of all aspects of the ocean.

Famous & Infamous Contact / Convenor Kay Mills

At our February meeting **Barbara Johnstone** chose **Indira Ghandi**, the first and only woman Indian Prime Minister, as her subject.

Being the daughter of Jawaharlal Nehru, the first Prime Minister of India, and the granddaughter of Motilal Nehru, a close associate of Mahatma Ghandi, Indira was steered towards politics at an early age. She joined the Congress Party in 1938 and by the late 1950's she was President of the Indian National Congress.

Indira Ghandi



Known for her remarkable speeches and strong views on various social and political issues, she often took the crowds by storm. Outspoken, yet humble, she had much to contribute to the nation.

She became Prime Minister in 1966 and in 1971, despite facing pressure from America, Indira defeated Pakistan in the Indo-Pakistan War and led the liberation of East Pakistan into independent Bangladesh.

Indira became known as the Iron Lady of India because of her strong standing in decisions that would affect India's politics. During her three terms as Prime Minister she instituted major reforms, including a strict population control program.

Indira was assassinated in 1984 by two of her Sikh bodyguards.

Definitely an extraordinarily famous person and one the group were pleased to have Barbara bring to our attention.



Food, Nutrition and Health Contact / Convenor Anny Dentener

For the first meeting of the Foodies Group (Food Nutrition & Health) we gathered at Anny Dentener's house to delve into the fascinating world of **chocolate**.

We followed each step of the process, from the growing and harvesting of the cacoa bean, to the beans entering the factory where they are dried and roasted, and sugar and milk powder are added to form liquid chocolate.

Then came the exciting part – the delicious learning experience of tasting many different kinds of chocolate. We used test sheets to evaluate each type and voice our opinion.

The group also ticked a list of potential topics, and identified food labels, nutrition info and the Health Star Rating of interest to most.

So in March these three facets will be investigated using the baking from scratch of ANZAC biscuits. At the end participants will get to taste them, of course, and take them home.

Anny put a lot of work into this first session and has developed a great programme for the rest of the year.

New Zealand History

Kelvin Mills' presentation at our February meeting was about a former prime minister of New Zealand, **Gordon Coates**, who was born at Pahi on the Kaipara Harbour in 1878 and who died in Wellington in 1943. A war hero with Victoria Cross and bar, Coates was a key minister in the 1920's - justice, postmaster general, public works, native affairs, and prime minister where he worked with Sir Apirana Ngata on improving relations with Māori.

Coates was elected to parliament in 1911, representing rural interests such as roading and freehold tenure of land, as opposed to leasehold. He stressed mechanization and accelerated dam construction on the Waikato River and the main trunk railways. He was very affable and enjoyed a strong rapport with gum diggers, mill workers and ordinary people.

Gordon Coates



Coates won the 1925 election handsomely, but by 1927 his developing stance on wider issues made him unpopular with his right wing colleagues and he lost office in 1928. Coates returned to the government between 1931-35 and used rigorous economic policies to combat the economic depression. He became extremely unpopular. Establishing the Mortgage Corporation to supply cheap credit, setting up a partly state-controlled reserve bank to control credit and his later involvement in Peter Fraser's wartime administration further estranged him from the political right.

It is almost impossible to associate Coates with any one political philosophy. He has left an important legacy and is an important link between the past and our modern political system.

Thank you, Kelvin, for introducing us to a key figure in the development of modern New Zealand social and political life.

Useful Information General Meetings

General Meetings are held at 10.00 am on the 4th Thursday of the month at the Old Flat Bush School Hall, corner of Flat Bush School Road and Murphys Road.

Parking : Use the secure parking area in Cranford Drive off Flat Bush School Road. Do not park on the driveway between the hall and Murphys Road.

Constitution : A copy of our constitution is available on request.

In an emergency....If we ever need to evacuate the hall in an emergency, please note...

- 1. Kelvin Mills is the Warden at our monthly meetings.
- 2. there are TWO emergency exit doors from the hall ...both are on the **south** side of the hall (the same side as the tea servery).
- 3. we meet in the carpark (to the west side of the hall) for a headcount.
- 4. Cardiac Arrest

The hall where we meet has an AED (Automatic External Defibrillator). It is on the wall on the right just inside the main entrance.

If someone has a suspected cardiac arrest, take the following action...

- Dial 111 for an ambulance.
- Lie the victim on his / her back, and remove all clothing covering the chest (a bare chest is essential).
- Turn on the AED, and follow the voice prompts. Audio instructions are automatically triggered when the defibrillator is opened.
- Everyone must stand clear when the AED is analysing or administering an electrical shock.
- Perform CPR (30 chest compressions / 2 breaths) until the ambulance arrives.
